Brigid O'Malley Clan Chieftain 2014-2015, A Profile

Bríd Ní Mháille, Brigid O'Malley, our Clan chieftain this year, 2014-15, celebrated her 80th birthday on October 8th 2014. Now resident in Chicago, Brigid was born to Anthony and Jane (Burke) in Doughmakeon, in the heart of O'Malley Country, in Louisburgh, Co. Mayo. After primary school at Accony National School, she cycled the three miles every day to Scoil Mhuire,the Mercy Convent School in Louisburgh where she was awarded her Intermediate Certificate in 1950.

In January 1951, she left Ireland with her brother Tom to join their elder sister, Mary Rita, in Chicago. She continued her studies at St. Sebastian's High School and graduated with distinction in June, 1952.

After working for a year, she joined the Ursuline Sisters in Toledo, Ohio. She studied for a BA in Education while training as a teacher, and taught a variety of grades while teaching at various Ursuline elementary and secondary and secondary schools in Ohio.

In the 70s she spent a number of years in Washington DC working with various Faith and Justice organisations and was active in the renewal movement of the laity and of women in the Catholic church. She also became involved with various Irish organisations in the larger DC area, and taught classes in the Irish Language to several people who were so interested. Many of her pupils became fluent in the language and still speak and correspond in it.

In 1982 after much soul searching she resigned from the Ursuline Sisters and continued to live and work in the DC area. She became an active member of the American Association of University Women, attended many conferences on Irish affairs in the United States and Ireland. She returned to teaching in DC during her final years there, before returning to Chicago, her original home in the United States, in 2000. She was welcomed back by Mary Rita, Tom and Frank and their families.

Since returning Brigid has been active in the affairs of the Irish American Heritage Center where she works for the welfare of both senior citizens and of Irish youth. She retains her enthusiasm for the Irish language, speaks it fluently and has been featured in programmes on Irish affairs in Chicago on Radio na Gaelteachta and TG4. She still teaches Irish to individuals and groups and is a keen promoter of all things Irish.

Over the past several decades Brigid has visited Ireland every summer and has been a regular participant in our annual Clan gatherings. She has been active in all the major debates on Clan policy and development and was chosen, unopposed, as our Tánaiste at our 2013 rally in Carna.

Brigid has attended several conferences on Irish affairs in the United States and in Ireland. She is a regular participant in the Bard Summer School on Clare Island. She is an enthusiastic promoter of natural health remedies and is an expert reflexologist. She is a professional graphologist – a handwriting analyst. She offers regular workshops on the subject to teachers.

Brigid looks forward to welcoming clan members and friends from the United States, especially from Chicago, and from other parts of the world. She hopes for a large attendance of local O'Malleys and people with links with the Clan. She plans to invite our recently appointed United States Ambassador, Mr Kevin O'Malley; our Clan Cardinal, Archbishop Seán O'Malley from Boston; and Maryland Governor, Martin O'Malley, all of whom, we hear, have Westport and Galway connections. *(Fr Padraig O'Malley)*

Croagh Patrick, The Holy Mountain that overlooks Clew Bay

Croagh Patrick, which overlooks Clew Bay in County Mayo, is considered the holiest mountain in Ireland. The tradition of pilgrimage to this holy mountain stretches back over 5,000 years from the Stone Age to the present day without interruption. Its religious significance dates back to the time of the pagans, when people are thought to have gathered here to celebrate the beginning of harvest season.

Croagh Patrick is renowned for its Patrician Pilgrimage in honour of Saint Patrick, Ireland's patron saint. It was on the summit of the mountain that Saint Patrick fasted for forty days in 441 AD and the custom has been faithfully handed down from generation to generation. The Black Bell of St Patrick was a highly venerated relic on Croagh Patrick for many vears.

The first stop on the pilgrimage is Saint Patrick's statue erected in 1928 by Reverend Father Patterson with money he



collected in America towards the rebuilding of Saint Mary's Church in Westport. Each year, The Reek, as it is colloquially known, attracts about 1 million pilgrims. On 'Reek Sunday', the last Sunday in July, over 25,000 pilgrims visit the Reek. At the top, there is a chapel where mass is celebrated and confessions are heard. Croagh Patrick is 5 miles from the picturesque town of Westport and its conical shape soars majestically above the surrounding countryside. Magnificent views of Clew Bay and the surrounding south Mayo countryside are spectacular from all stages of the ascent of the mountain. It is one of the highest peaks in the West of Ireland. It rises 750 metres (2,500 feet) into the sky above County Mayo.
