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The Munitir Eoin (Mounterown) O'Malleys



The family of Michael O'Malley of Mounterown (Muintir Eoin) had connections with the Maam Valley, Co. Galway. Michael was married to Sarah Joyce of Leenane and had eight children. Of these Pádhraig took a prominent place in Irish public life. He was a pioneer in the Gaelic League or Irish Language organisation, and was a member of the first Dáil (Irish Parliament) which met in 1919.

Together with his four brothers he took part in the War of Independence, when they were members of the First Batallion of the West Connemara Brigade of the I.R.A.. Pádhraig Ó Máille's house at Mounterown became the brigade headquarters, and was the scene of an attack by about 25 men of the Royal Irish Constabulary on the night of 22^{nd} April 1921. An equal number of defenders kept this party at bay, killing one policeman and wounding two others, although they suffered from a severe shortage of arms and ammunition. On the following day the enemy was reinforced by thirteen lorries loaded with military and police. The first party returned to Maam, while the new force attacked the house, making prisoners of two women and two children, who were by then the only occupants, and then burned the house to the ground. The I.R.A. party remained "on the run" in the area, and succeeded eluding the enemy forces until the Truce of July.

Pádhraig Ó Máille later became Deputy Speaker of the Dáil and was seriously wounded on a Dublin street on 7th December 1922 during the Civil War. His companion Seán Hales, T.D. (member of Parliament) was shot dead. This incident led to the execution in reprisal by the Free State government of Rory O'Connor, Liam Mellows, Joseph McKelvey and Richard Barrett, who had been prisoners in their custody since the surrender of the Four Courts in the previous June. This was a controversial decision, which although indefensible on strictly legal grounds, was successful in its objective of preventing further attacks on public representatives, but it was to sow the seeds of a bitterness which is still inseparable from Irish politics.

Pádhraig's brother Tomás, who died in 1938 at the early age of 54, was a scholar of international repute in the field of Celtic philology. The renowned French scholar Vendryes wrote that "it was universally felt that the loss of a man like Tomás Ó Máille, so cruel for his relations and friends, was a cause of sorrow to the whole of Ireland". A committee formed to commemorate his memory described him as the champion of learning and the Irish language.

He studied under those pioneers of Celtic Studies, Meyer, Strachan and Thurneysen, in Liverpool, Manchester and Frieburg im Breisgau (Germany), respectively, and was later to be professor of Irish language and Literature in what is now University College Galway, from 1909 until his death. Among his numerous publications, two were to be milestones in the study of the Irish language, namely Urlabhraidheacht (1927), a work on phonetics, and An Béal Beo (1936), which was a repository of the living language of the day. For many years he edited a local Irish language journal An Stoc, and devoted himself to fostering a knowledge and love of the language among his students and the general public.

Quiet Man Cottage to be protected



White O'Morn cottage, in Maam in Connemara, is expected to be formally granted State protection next month, when a vote is put before members of Galway County Council.

Over the past decades it has fallen into rack and ruin and is now unrecognizable from the John Ford-directed 1952 movie, which starred John Wayne and Maureen O'Hara.

Actor Liam Neeson recently added his voice to the campaign to get the cottage restored, stating: "It has been lying in ruins for way too many years."But California-based Greg Ebbit, who has been the registered owner of the property since 1985, said he fears the crumbling cottage will never be

restored to it its former glory if it is declared a protected structure. He said: "It's always been my intention to restore it and it still is, but I'd be concerned that I won't legally be able to do anything with it if it's given State protection. My fear is that the ruling will mean it has to remain as a pile of stones."
