The De Burgo O'Malley Chalice 1494

The De Burgo O'Malley Chalice, which is now in The National Museum in Dublin is one of the finest of the Galway and Mayo Chalices. It is of silver gilt, is 23cm high was made for Burrishole Friary.

The inscription on its base gives us the only clues We have as to its origin. This reads in translation "Thomas De Burgo and Grannia Ni Mallecaused me to be made in the year of our Lord 1494"

Thomas De Burgo has been tentatively identified by Martin Blake as Thomas Crosach Bourke, grandson of Richard Bourke, the founder of Burrishole Friary, near Newport in County Mayo. Mr Blake further identifies this Gráinne as being the granddaughter of Diarmuid O'Malley, Lord of Owles in 1415. Her Great Grandniece was the more famous Gráinne Ní Mháille of the sixteenth century, who married into the same Bourke family about the year 1566.

This fifteenth century alliance is indicative of the good relations existing between the Bourkes and O'Malleys at this early period and of their high regard for each other.

The style of this chalice has been affected by foreign influences which had been modifying the native tradition from the coming Normans in the eleventh century. Similar chalices have been noted in England and Sweden and the art historian Bruce Arnold has remarked that a certain similarity between it and The Processional Cross of Lislaughtin, found near Ballylongford in County Kerry would point to a connection between the craftsmen who made the two works.

A common feature of the two works of art is an almost identical knop surrounded by eight diamond shaped silver panels bearing floral decorations. This knop or boss appears on the stem of the chalice and on the base of the cross.

The De Burgo O'Malley Chalice was sold in 1897 by Anthony Walter Blake Dowling, Son of the owner of the chalice, William Darcy Dowling, a solicitor living in Tullamore, County Offaly, whose parents had lived at Longford Castle, County Galway. It was bought by Lord Swaythling M.P. at Christie's in London, and was acquired by The National Museum of Ireland in 1924.

The chalice also features in a recent publication "A History of Ireland in 100 objects"
