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# DNA Testing unlocking the history of O'Malleys

# "Finding Grace" in Ireland. Why DNA in America?

Genetic testing cannot change recorded history, but it can help set the record straight. More important it can connect us in the present. That connection can further what often began as a personal, even lonely, quest. The Finding Grace project has done just that. In looking back to the Pirate Queen and what we know of her male relatives, Finding Grace is helping connect O'Malleys in America.


Interest in ancestry invariably begins with something: an old family Bible, a hand-me-down artifact, a remembrance of a conversation long ago not pursued, a scent or sound of vivid recall. Mine was a book. A small, green-bound volume that sat in the same spot on a shelf in our living room, the spine faded by the afternoon sun. It was never taken down. It was like many things Irish from the past. Shelved.

One hundred and forty years ago my grandfather, Charles J. O'Malley, left Newport, Co Mayo, and discovered America. He was just 16, the youngest of 17, 34 years younger than the first born, and schooled. For seventy years he embraced America as newspaperman turned advertising executive, married well into a Missouri family from the Alsace, raised a Catholic family of five in Boston, travelled the world and wrote of what he witnessed. His book, *It Was News To Me*, was published in 1939. Prior to publication, he

printed a brochure, The Discovery of America.

My mother, Lucille Fusz O'Malley, was the third of his five children. Marie Celestè, the youngest of the five, died in 2022 at the age of 104. Gramps' life and his memories may look back over seven centuries but his book was dismissed by his immediate family as something of an embarrassment: disjointed, anecdotal, riddled with inaccuracies, and self-aggrandizing. Irish. He could write, however, with first-hand authority: "My own grandfather was born in 1745, my father in 1800 {He was buried in the ancient abbey of Burrishoole, near the ancestral home of his family, in a grave hallowed by the ashes of twelve generations which had preceded him}, and I in 1867." I knew him as a child. He died in 1955.

Gramps was not the first O'Malley from Newport to discover America. Charles M. O'Malley, his first cousin once removed, was. As if preordained, Charles, born in 1807 in Newport, entered the Seminary at Maynooth.

Bridling at allegiance to the Queen of England and support for the Established Church, he soon transferred to Laval Seminary in Montreal. A cholera epidemic closed Laval and CM heard another calling. He journeyed to the Upper Peninsula of Michigan and by 1833 was ably employed in John Jacob Astor's fur trade on Mackinac Island. He prospered. He first brought over his brother Tully. Again Gramps: "Later on about fifty families, most of whom were relatives of mine, settled in Mackinac and in St. Ignace, across the Straits. One of them, Michael Murray, purchased the land in which the great Father Marquette was buried." More O'Malleys would follow...in large numbers.


Only now are we learning how many, thanks in part to DNA testing. They would populate the UP fanning out north and south from Mackinac Island. Others would cross Lake Michigan to northern Wisconsin on Lake Superior settling in an arc from Houghton to Madeline Island to Bayfield to Rhinelander. In "Finding Grace" we are discovering O'Malleys in America.

Let's back up a bit: I am an Irish citizen because of Gramps in the quaintly entitled *Book of Foreign Births*. Equipped with Gramps' book and a newly issued EU passport, I sailed across the Atlantic in 2005 in the

Rolex Transatlantic Race. On the return I stopped off in Dublin to research Grace O'Malley in the National Library of Ireland. I found and photocopied enough to pique my interest but became distracted by research into my McLoughlin heritage. For 14 years.

In 2019, I returned to Ireland on a McLoughlin-related Harnett Reunion in Abbeyfeale and drove up to Newport for the first time. There I was introduced to Clan O'Malley. I established my bona fides and learned of the 300<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration of the founding of Newport scheduled for 2020. I ate at The Grainne Uaile. I was an O'Malley in search of my relation to the Pirate Queen.

Then COVID hit. The world went into lock-down. Enter the "Finding Grace" project and Maurice Gleeson and Brendan O'Malley. And DNA.

What is DNA? To borrow a title, it was news to me. Deoxyribonucleic acid (DNA) is a molecule that contains the biological instructions that make each species unique. DNA is passed from adult organisms to their offspring during reproduction. X and Y chromosomes determine the biological sex of an individual: females inherit an X chromosome from the father for a XX genotype, while males inherit a Y chromosome from the father for a XY genotype. Upsetting news at the outset: no O'Malley Y in me. My Y is from my McLoughlin father.

"Finding Grace" is something of a misnomer. Grace, of course, didn't have any Y-DNA even though she fought like she did. We're really matching Y-DNA now, O'Malley father to O'Malley son, to get closer to the known historical record back then. That's where books like Gramps' are helpful.

For the "Finding Grace" project I was detailed to locate male, Y-bearing O'Malleys in America. I had to convince my male first cousins, sons of my mother's brothers, to take the test. Through the good offices of his sister, my first cousin, Owen O'Malley, Gramps' first grandson, took the Big Y test the week before he died in 2021. The preliminary Y-DNA 37 test suggests an O'Malley connection. The Big Y defines how close you are to Grace. Good news, we were in the hunt.

Gramps went to Manistee, Michigan shortly after arriving in America to join his oldest brother, JP (1843-1903). He writes early in *IWNTM* that his brother was warned to leave Glasgow and escape to America or he would be shot for 'treason' against England. He was buying arms for rebel efforts against England.

"My brother occupied a choice spot in the center of a crate. Upon arriving in Dublin he was secretly taken off and transferred to a vessel bound for America. On arrival in New York, he joined the Irish soldiers of the Union Army who made an abortive attempt to capture Canada. He was assigned to a command at Detroit, Michigan, prior to the invasion of Canada. The arms with which they were furnished were supplied with ammunition of a different caliber from the guns. This was a well-conceived plan by the traitor La Caron. When the invasion was stopped by the United States Government, the Irish patriots dispersed, my brother going to Chicago."

JP subsequently moved on to Manistee on the UP and founded the *Manistee Advocate* where Gramps learned the printing process before turning to journalism. I couldn't find much else about JP until two years ago when I happened upon his great grandchildren, now seniors. JP had had four daughters. Interestingly, one of them, my mother's contemporary, had passed along a dog-eared copy of Gramps' pamphlet to her daughter. Given the difference in age between Gramps and JP, the current generation are my first cousins once removed. Her brother's middle name: O'Malley. They knew virtually nothing of their Irish heritage until our connection.

CM and Tully never married, hence no Y handed down there. They are buried together with a shared tombstone in St Anne's Cemetery on Mackinac Island. Tully in 1852. CM in 1880. And nothing doing from JP. Dry hole and I stopped digging.

Then last month, Maurice Gleeson introduced me to two lovely, lively ladies in Oregon, first cousins, who had recently combined forces searching for their O'Malley connections. Their extended research, one is a military historian, encouraged them to have their 80-year-old first cousin, Mealue, to take both tests. BINGO! In DNA-connect, he and they lined up with Owen, me and mine. With a DNA record, what's in a name?

Me and the Oregon ladies ZOOM'd. Searching for a person in common, one asked if I knew of a Charles O'Malley and his brother Tully. Gramps had mentioned them in his book, but I paid them little mind. We agreed to share what we knew. One thing led to another. Mackinac State Historic Parks found some important papers. One an article about Charles O'Malley by Gramps in 1926 in the American Irish Historical Society. (AIHS archives are not fully digitized.) Another, a brief biography of Charles by Edward M. Gill in 2012. Gill, an O'Malley descendant from Mackinac and Clinton, Massachusetts, another hot bed of O'Malleys, was researching tombstones on Mackinac Island. We were on to something. I sent the Oregon ladies my lending copy of *IWNTM*. The book is out of print.

Maurice Gleeson alerted me to another Y-DNA 37 connection in Oregon, Wisconsin. I cold called an O'Malley in Oregon. We talked hesitantly until a connection was made. Seems a close relative seeking her own O'Malley connection had stopped off in Oregon and asked him to take the test. She and I had traded emails two years ago but could find no relation. He sent me a picture of his father. Her name was on the corner of the picture. They were kin. Not only was she now a confirmed O'Malley, but we are probably related. Her great grandfather was likely a brother of CM. To be confirmed by a Big Y test from Oregon O'Malley.

"Finding Grace" provides a genetic link to the past. From the living to as far back as we can accurately trace our history. It's all there to be discovered. Then it writes itself.


She has led a nomadic life that has taken her across Asia, Europe and North America. She has been an educator at museums, at various schools and organizations, and has been a hiking guide in the American West.

# International Women's Day: The sheer magnetism of Grace O'Malley

Biographer Anne Chambers writes about her journey in the company of iconic 16th century feminist Grace O'Malley, a trailblazer from the west of Ireland.

The endurance and popularity of her biography reflects the sheer magnetism of its subject. Grace O'Malley (Granuaile) continues to enthral, inspire and capture the imagination of new generations of devotees worldwide as she undoubtedly first captured mine.

To take on the life story of Grace O'Malley in one's early 20's, as I had the temerity to do, looking back on it now, was a daunting task, attempting to understand, analyse and empathise with such an iconic, experienced, pioneering woman who had filled so many diverse roles in her long life.

The passage of time, however, and the knowledge and experience that life endows, gives me hope that in the latest (11th) edition of the biography that I may finally have 'got Grace'! For many centuries Grace O'Malley was a victim of the mainly male orientation of historical record. While she had more than created her own legend, she nonetheless never appeared in the pages of my school history books, which left me to wonder, no doubt like many others, if she had ever existed.

Despite the fact, as I subsequently discovered, her life is well documented in the Elizabethan State Papers and other contemporary collections, and her name, unique for a woman, enshrined in the famous 1599 Boazio map of Ireland (the only female leader ever so listed), it was her absence from Irish historical record that initially motivated my own interest.

Imprisoned within the swirls and flourishes of these faded, brittle Elizabethan parchment relics, the story of Grace O'Malley sprang to life. When analysed within the historical context of the traumatic epoch in which she lived, as well as being a wife, mother, divorcee, lover, widow, grandmother and great-grandmother, she emerges as a fearless leader, by land and by sea, a shrewd political tactician, an intrepid seafarer, successful independent business woman, ruthless plunderer, mercenary, rebel, the protective matriarch of her family and her tribe.

Above all else she was a woman who broke the mould and refused to allow the barriers placed in her path, either by society or by nature, to deter her from her quest.

Grace O'Malley's place and contribution to political, social and maritime history is now acknowledged and celebrated. Her factual story has been documented for radio and television worldwide and she has inspired a new generation of artists, sculptors, fiction writers, poets, musicians and composers. To judge by the messages and requests I receive from students from all over the world, she is now also part of schools' curricula.

Over the last 40 years my own journey in her company has lead me to many places around the world to tell her story; from the old pirate city of Port Royal in Jamaica to the hallowed halls of Harvard University, from Greenwich to Galway, and many places in between. She has introduced me to many people whose own lives and careers have been inspired and shaped by this extraordinary woman.

From the 'Krewe of Grace O'Malley', a women's self-help group in Florida, the annual international 'Wander Woman Pirate Queen Tour' of her territory on the west coast, festivals in her home county of Mayo, the annual O'Malley Clan Rally, to recently featuring on Forbes Magazine, her story continues to make an impact and in so many ways.

#### **RESONATE**

International focus on gender equality, the Me-Too movement and other feminist campaigns, makes the life of Grace O'Malley, albeit lived over 400 years ago, resonate even more today.

She shines as an inspirational beacon to women everywhere as an example of what can be achieved, even in the most demanding and difficult environments.

For Grace O'Malley it was to survive, against the odds, the political and social chaos and destruction perpetrated against herself, her family and followers during the military conquest of her country in the 16th century, as well as to survive the dangers and awesome power of the formidable Atlantic Ocean.

As ageism in society, particularly attitudes to older women, comes under greater scrutiny today, that she retained her status as a woman of power and influence and remained actively involved, by land and sea to the end of her long life, makes Grace O'Malley a symbol of positive ageing.

And through her example comes the realisation for women everywhere that age need not be a terminus – merely another port of call.

My own voyage in the company of this pioneering woman seems destined to continue as her story, a

testimony to female ability and endurance, is even more relevant today to counteract the widespread discrimination, inequality and negativity that continues to exist in politics, society, business and religion, preventing women from achieving and developing their potential and thereby depriving society of a reservoir of intuition, talent, knowledge and experience.

As former President of Ireland, Mary McAleese, writes in her forward to the

biography: "Grace O'Malley's story...can in the end make us smile, knowing that for women – and for civilisation – the best is yet to come if we follow her star."



# Forestcore is the nature-inspired aesthetic taking over TikTok – here's why

Forestcore is about creating a feeling of being outside and in nature through interiors and the furnishings in your home. Stylist speaks to an expert about how best to achieve the look.



Filling your home with plants is really one of life's simple pleasures.

There's nothing like kicking back in a biophilic-inspired space to help give your bedroom or living room a natural lift while elevating your decor and also providing numerous mental health benefits (a recent study found just being in the presence of indoor plants can improve mental and physical health). One trend inspiring us to make our homes event more plant-friendly is forestcore, a new decor trend taking over TikTok as people continue to seek to bring the outside in.

"Forestcore is about creating a feeling of being outside and in nature through interiors and the furnishings in your home," says Leanne O'Malley of online retailer Studio.

"This may be through dark colours, wood, stone, plants and natural textures, which all help create this theme."

The home decor aesthetic has amassed more than 160 million views on TikTok, with people sharing how they've transformed their spaces into a woodland paradise with muted colours, plush fabrics and plants.

While there are elements of forestcore that are reminiscent of other aesthetics like cottagecore,

there is a greater focus on subtly threading nature throughout your home and creating a woodland feel inside your space, while cottagecore is filled with lighter colours, tons of florals and vintage-inspired furniture. In other words, cottagecore is a little bit more like spring while forestcore gives off the vibe of autumn.

"The calming effects of being surrounded by countryside are a contributing factor to why people are embracing nature and bringing in elements of the outside," says O'Malley.

"In fact, interior design that connects us to nature is thought to contribute to a stronger sense of wellbeing and boost creativity and productivity. Google searches for 'blue floral wallpaper' and 'wild flower wallpaper' have both increased by 48% year on year, as people look for a way to incorporate a decor style that combines traditional elements, such as florals, with more modern motifs."

O'Malley adds that bringing nature into the home through the forestcore trend is a great way to experiment with textures.

"In the living room, pair fleecy throw blankets with leather upholstery. In the bedroom, add a velvet headboard to a wooden bedframe," she suggests.

So now that we all know a bit about forestcore, how exactly can we incorporate the look into our homes? Well, we've got you covered with a few simple steps to get your forestcore decor going.

#### Plants, plants and more plants

"One simple way to achieve the forestcore look is to add a variety of plants and greenery to your space. If you don't have green fingers, there are a vast array of artificial plants and ferns to choose from."




# Perils & Prospects of a United Ireland

Perils and Prospects of a United Ireland by Padraig O'Malley

Padraig O'Malley's *Perils and Prospects of a United Ireland* presents a wide-ranging and unique study of the questions around the future of Northern Irish politics, including the idea of reunification.

O'Malley has forged relationships across the political divide for over half a century and here he attemps to ascertain whether, after decades of interaction – but especially since the B/GFA – the protagonists are any closer to working co-operatively.

In this book, O'Malley explores the factors that might lead to the Northern Ireland Secretary of State calling a border referendum and the challenges both Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland would face. How might that majority for unity, a simple 50 per cent + 1, emerge? What criteria might a Secretary of State draw on to make their judgment call?

Including interviews from ninety-seven political players, academics, political influencers, a cross-section of the political grandees who negotiated the B/GFA and faith leaders between February 2020 and June 2021, O'Malley takes a temperature check of opinions from Northern Ireland with a sampling of opinion in the South

Interviewees included party leaders Jeffrey Donaldson (Democratic Unionist Party, DUP), Doug Beattie (Ulster Unionist Party, UUP), Naomi Long (Alliance), Colum Eastwood (Social Democratic and Labour Party, SDLP) and Billy Hutchinson (Progressive Unionist Party, PUP), and members of the Ard Comhairle, Matt Carty TD and Chris Hazzard MP.

Focusing on the topics of the Northern Ireland Protocol, the Good Friday Agreement, Brexit, Unionism, Nationalism, the economics of potential reunification or continued partition, and the broad range of Northern Irish identities, this work encompasses the most up-to-date and considered review of political actions so far. A must-read for those interested in the future of Northern Ireland.



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# Prof Mark O'Malley helping to de-carbonise the grid

# Professor Mark O'Malley has joined Imperial College London as the Leverhulme International Professor of Power Systems.

Professor O'Malley joins the Department of Electrical and Electronic Engineering to lead a research team of 13 working to decarbonise the electricity grid, supported by £4million in funding from The Leverhulme Trust.

The grant will focus on developing technologies to run the power grid – the network that delivers electricity from producers to consumers, also known as the electricity grid – using 100 per cent renewable energy like wind and solar.



Professor O'Malley said: "Climate change is the biggest challenge of our generation. A powerful way to tackle this will be transitioning to a fully decarbonised electricity grid, and one way of doing this is by going towards 100 % renewable electricity.

"No one organisation, no matter how large or well-resourced, can solve this challenge alone. Therefore, a global collaborative approach is required, working across the research, industry, and end-use communities to solve the challenges at the pace and scale that is needed."

The research will be done in collaboration with the Global Power System Transformation Consortium (G-PST), which Professor O'Malley co-founded prior to joining Imperial when he was at the National Renewable Energy Laboratory in the USA as Chief Scientist of Energy System Integration.

Mr Fintan Slye, the Director of National Grid Electricity System Operator and Chair of the CEO group of the G-PST, said: "This project will contribute substantially to the goals of the G-PST and will further enhance the UK's strong reputation in transitioning to Net Zero, which is of vital national and international importance. It provides an enormous opportunity for the UK, Imperial, and the research team to make a real lasting global impact on climate change."

Recognised as a world authority on integrating the electricity grid with renewable energy sources as part of the transition to a Net Zero economy - a key strategic priority for the College. Professor O'Malley said: "My new professorship will enable us to set a bold new direction for pursuing zero-carbon energy systems." Also joining Imperial as part of Professor O'Malley's team is Dr Elina Spyrou, who has developed and applied engineering-economic models to identify cost-effective, reliable, and equitable solutions for future power systems in the developing and developed world.

Dr Spyrou said: "I am thrilled to join the team at this point of the energy transition, when our research community can help accelerate the decarbonisation of electricity systems and lay the groundwork to combat climate change."

Professor Eric Yeatman, Head of the Department of Electrical and Electronic Engineering, said: "The addition of Professor O'Malley and Dr Spyrou to Imperial's academic staff is a welcome boost to our already strong reputation in decarbonisation of electricity grids, and to Imperial's Transition to Zero Pollution initiative."

# Decarbonising the grid

Energy from fossil fuels is a major driver of the greenhouse gas emissions that are warming our climate. Transitioning from a fossil fuel reliant society to one that embraces renewable sources like wind and solar power will play a major part in limiting the climate crisis.

While grid-integrated renewables are not the only solution to climate change, they are a major part of decarbonising the energy system. The challenge lies in integrating energy from renewable sources into the grid with a view to enabling the grid to operate with 100 per cent renewable-powered generation.

However, increasing the input from renewable energy resources brings challenges: for example, wind and solar generation, unlike fossil fuelled generation, connects to the grid with inverter-based resources which will alter the fundamental characteristics of the electricity grid, requiring new operational and planning techniques and technologies.

Professor O'Malley's team is working to develop technologies that enables a decarbonised grid to reliably maintain supply-demand balance, at all points in time, at all locations, equitably, at the least cost, with minimum impact on the environment. The Leverhulme International Professorships grant aims to help universities attract a globally leading scholar to take up a permanent professorial post in the UK.

Niall FitzGerald, Chairman of the Leverhulme Trust Board, said: "Through the Leverhulme International Professorship scheme, the Trust aims to maintain the UK's international standing as a world-renowned research destination; open to outstanding talent and ideas from around the globe."
