#### FROM

#### Four Families and Me

In the beginning, and for sixty years, I knew little of my past. Ancestral past, that is. I grew up in Brooklyn surrounded by relatives, relationships unknown and unquestioned. The first McLoughlin arrived in the 1850's; the last, my second cousin, died there in 2022 – almost 175 years of continuous McLoughlin occupation. Brooklyn's neighborhoods were defined by parishes. I went to the same parochial school as my father with further education also under

the Jesuit banner. Homes were not real estate. They were housing for large families. Nobody was rich or poor, but we were comfortable.

Father – we addressed our parents as 'mother' and 'father' – died in 1975, aged 68. Too many Chesterfields early on gave him emphysema in his final years. Successful life; pretty miserable ending. We never talked about things personal, nor about immediate family, much less ancestors. Nobody did back in the day. Life went on with mother (an O'Malley) at the top of the flagpole. I knew something of the O'Malley's from summers on Boston's South Shore. Gramps had written a book but he died before I was old enough to show interest in his past. The book, all so much blather to his children, was but a placeholder on family shelves. It would prove pivotal to this writing.

Between Brooklyn and Boston my life was fairly circumscribed, my world limited, ancestry undiscovered. I did have a sense of inherited Faith and character without knowing how I knew. I was hardly an ancestral orphan, just an ignorant pup, the last of five in a traditional post-war Irish-Catholic family in Brooklyn. As I wrote in Part I, that would all change in 2005 when I researched Grace O'Malley at the National Library of Ireland in Dublin. That same year we received an inquiry via Ancestry.com, "Are you by any chance related to the McSweeny's?" "Yes indeedy!" Five years later we discovered

the McSweeny Chalice. Grace O'Malley would become the personage that would lead me into the history of my people. The McSweeny Chalice would be the talisman reflecting the Faith of my forbearers through time. Together, Grace and the Chalice, would become the rootstock for Four Families and Me. Never could I have imagined how the vine would grow.

## FROM "Four Families and Me" - Part 2

#### Calix Filiorum Suibhanei

"This was kept for two hundred sixty eight years in the family of priests whose names are on it, and was deposited in the museum of the Great Seminary in New York by Rev. Edward McSweeny (or Mac Swiney), on the feast of Saint Barthollemew 1908. It was made in 1640 for the priest named in the legend, and is small and plain, tho lastly, - suitable for easy carriage and concealment in those days of blood. It was regilt and then reconsecrated by Archbishop Corrigan ('59 Mount Saint Mary's) and used by him at the consecration of St Brigid's Church, Manhattan, New York City, in 1898, the pastor of the church being the Rev. Patrick Francis McSweeny, Senior of the McSweeny brother-priests."





mass with the chalice on ceremonial occasions, but getting to see it would take three years. The archivist for the Archdiocese was an elderly nun who owned the reputation of 'not letting anyone in and not letting anything out'. She answered to no one but the archives she guarded. Finally she was called home and I was let in. It is difficult to convey the feeling of cradling this old sacred vessel, which history I knew. Pursuing that history would take me to Ireland.

The McSweeny Chalice is used annually at the Cardinal's St. Patrick's Day Mass at St Patrick's Cathedral in New York. Its significance, however, is far less the object itself than the journey it took and the

history it witnessed in the hands of McSweeny priests since Father Danielis Swynye "me fieri fecit" in 1640. Were it not for St. Patrick's Cathedral and the Parade, the

chalice might never have left the vault of St. Joseph's Seminary. The church has new immigrants, and their saints, to recognize. The Irish impact was a long time ago. But that is what this writing is all about.


## Whitechurch Cemetery, Whitechurch CO Cork


In 2017 I went to Ireland with my monsignor from New York who had relatives in Cork and was a frequent visitor. Monsignor Leonard had also hosted John Buckley, Bishop of Cork and Ross, when he came to New York to offer mass for fallen firefighters in the aftermath of 9/11.

I reconstructed its journey from 1640. Fr McSweeny's letter of transmittal was a primary source but well supported by the historical record. We had located the graveyard for the McSweeny family from modern methods, but little could have prepared me for what I encountered. Breathtaking.

We had the overgrowth removed to reveal a fallen obelisk similar to that of the newer McSwiney grave site in the distance. At the time I did not recognize the significance of the enclosed railings on both, unique in the cemetery, until coming upon Caitriona Paudeen

extolling the fancy (The Dirty Dust: Cré na Cille by Máirtin Ó Cadhain) "Having a cross here is like having a big slate house aboveground, a house with a name over the door,...an iron gate with a bowered arch overhanging it, security and money in the bank. The railings on the grave are just the same as the fancy borders around the Earl's house." The McSweeny's were both secular players and church builders. Patrick McSwiney had willed the chalice to Dean Denis McSwiney who in turn sent it to his priest cousins in America. As important as McSweeny priests were to Cork in the 18th and 19th centuries, it was in America, and particularly in New York, where they left their mark. The little McSweeny Chalice on the altar at St Patrick's Cathedral stands as grand testimony.







Above: The journey of the McSweeny Chalice






### St Patrick Claim

In 2012, I found *The Mac Laughlins of Clan Owen* buried high in the stacks of the Brooklyn Historical Society. It would add much to the treasury but how could I make claim if nobody else could see it? I kept it to myself...until 2025 when, can you imagine (?), it was available print-on demand\*.

Legare Street Press stated on the back cover, "This work has been selected by scholars as being culturally important, and is part of the knowledge base of civilization as we know it." Claim on.

The book makes a number of useful – to me – points: my father's name is Maurice as was his father's. The Mac Laughlins were rulers of the land from 528 A.D. till 1165 A.D. It places St Patrick in Ulster, now CO Louth. It would even stand the test of **Ireland's Saint – The Essential Biography of St.**

Bury. Nothing in contradiction. It suggests a strong link between McSweeny and McLoughlin, neighbors in the north, going far back. Finally it ties dramatically to the Centennial in 1908 in a way inimitable to the transfer of Irish Faith to America.

of O'Donnel, standing with his harness on in that lonely cave in Donggal, his master's hand upon his mane and foot in stirrup, until the first blast shall burst the rock between them and the blue sky and the freedom of their country.

Not very far from 400 A. D. Niall the Great, King of all Ireland, invaded Brittany, and, amongst other captives, brought back to Ireland a boy of noble family, who was sold to a land owner in the North. The boy escaped from his bondage, and, after years of study and discipline, returned to Ireland with the gospel and the name Patricius. Niall had amongst others two sons, Conal and Owen. Afterwards, in his progress through the country, Patrick staid some time with Conal, and from his house went to the castle of Aileach, the residence of Owen, who came out to meet him, received him with great deference, and was finally with all his household and clan converted. Now Owen had a grandson Murtogh or Maurice, learned,

It is from this Murtogh that the Mac Laughlins are descended. History tells us that he fought as many as seventeen bloody battles; but it does not

seventeen hoody balaies, but notes the disrecord the details or the causes of the dissensions that led to his wars. On the other hand, it does give the minutest account of the literary and religious development of his reign. From his death in 528 A. D. till 1165 A.D., when died his descendant Murtogh Mac Laughlin, the last King of Ireland before the invasion of the Anglo-Normans, many of the rulers of the land were of his blood. This last Murtogh was a prince of strong religious feeling: he built a Cathedral for the Bishop of Derry in 1165. But with all finally wrought his ruin. For after having made peace with one of his vassals, having

#### O'Malley Markers in America


Tombstones are etched in words or symbols – hard and fixed – no life-story there. But they do capture how the interred wanted to be remembered. Charles M. O'Malley, first cousin to Gramp's father, was as his stone simply states, "Born in Newport County Mayo Ireland 1807." He lies next to his younger brother, Tulley, in a shared grave on Mackinac Isle above the Upper Peninsula of Michigan. Neither married and perhaps Charles M. (to distinguish him from Charles J.) wanted to convey a degree of comity that didn't reflect their brief years together. Tulley died when Island House was completed. CM would carry on quite prominently for another thirty years. "By the 1880s the Island House was known as 'The best family hotel on the Island." CM is credited with an influx of O'Malley's to the UP including Gramps' brother, JP, who settled in Manistee Michigan. Manistee would also be Gramps' first stop in America. Gramps' tombstone in Evergreen Cemetery in Boston reflects a stronger O'Malley identification. He had a rearing horse take the place of Grace's wild boar perhaps with the thought that the image of a stallion was more appropriate in America. The plot was purchased and the stone carved upon the death of his beloved wife, Lucille Fusz, who had not a trickle of Irish blood in her. (He was not the same man thereafter.) He chose the plot in the non-Catholic cemetery, or so the story goes, so he could keep an eye on Archbishop William Henry O'Connell who would be buried across the street at Boston College. They were very different people.

## Preface to Part III

No story of family is ever complete, particularly if one is dealing with over 1500 years from St. Patrick to Pope Leo XIV. There is always something more. That said, **F R O M – Four Families And Me** could not have been written much before now. For years I worked alone on mine by me. There was little coherence, fewer facts, less corroboration. Three items changed that, made the circle round.

#### The O'Malley Family Project

Gramps wrote in his book that there were 12 generations of his relatives who were buried at Burrishoole Abbey. The formal genealogical pursuit by Maurice Gleeson and Brendan O'Malley put genes to the test. Lacking O'Malley Y-DNA (I was a Y-not) had me engage my O'Malley cousins. They took the test. The results put me on course. It also led to discovering other relatives,

including JP's descendants. People, relatives, literally appeared. A number of my family now interested I attended the 300th Anniversary of the founding of Newport in 2022. The results of the Family Project continue to grow as more relatives participate. (You will hear the progress at the Clan Gathering later this month.)

Plentiful Country by Tyler Anbinder (2024)

Professor Anbinder examined the exhumed records of the Emigrant Savings Bank, the bank of choice for Irish Famine Immigrants. He found banking records of McLoughlin's and McSweeny's, my relatives, indicating their success. He contacted me for permission to use family photographs and we met. The story grew. With a historian's discipline he proved what I thought I knew. Comforting.

#### **The Viscount Mayo Chalice**


Perhaps nothing could have surprised me more than the discovery of the Viscount Mayo Chalice. In the course of the 2022 Clan Gathering we went

on a day trip to Ballintubber Abbey. There in the sacristy they produced a small, elegant silver chalice. The engraved variant of 'me fieri fecit' on its base startled me. It was dated 1635. I realized that O'Malley and McSweeny /McLoughlin history was enshrined in two chalices uniquely bestowed on me. Undeserved ancestry, but now all part of the story to be told, the story of **F R O M – Four Families and Me.**

## Fighting the scourge that is Sepsis – Ciaran & Orlaith Staunton

Irish couple's fight to end sepsis sees legislation reintroduced in Congress

Ciaran and Orlaith Staunton say the reintroduction of the SEPSIS Act in US Congress "is a major milestone in the fight against a preventable and treatable

condition."

**Ciaran and Orlaith Staunton following** the death of their 12-year-old son Rory in New York in 2012, **announced yesterday**, **June 5**, **that** the SEPSIS Act **has been reintroduced into Congress**. If passed, the bill would guarantee an investment of \$20 million annually that would expand outreach and education to hospitals to encourage adoption of the CDC's comprehensive new sepsis guidelines, Hospital Sepsis Program Core Elements.

It would also finalize and implement a sepsis outcome measure, improve data collection on pediatric sepsis, and create an incentive program for hospitals to improve sepsis outcomes. End Sepsis said in a statement on Thursday that the legislation represents a major milestone in its national effort to combat the sepsis crisis.

The bipartisan bill is being co-sponsored by Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-NY), Senator Susan Collins (R-ME), and Senator Andy Kim (D-NJ).

Sen Schumer, who previously introduced the SEPSIS Act in 2024, said on Thursday that he will continue to urge the Trump Administration and the CDC to ensure that sepsis is prioritized on a federal level.

"I am grateful to my dear friends Ciaran and Orlaith Staunton from New York who went through the worst thing a parent could endure – losing their 12-year-old son Rory to sepsis a decade ago," Sen Schumer said.

"Instead of retreating to darkness, they turned their grief into action to raise awareness for the disease and are working to create a future where no parent has to experience the same pain." End Sepsis noted on Thursday that "in a powerful show of support," the bill has also been endorsed by the American Hospital Association and the Federation of American Hospitals, two leading voices in the healthcare sector.

To mark this important development, End Sepsis returned to Capitol Hill this week to engage with lawmakers and staff.

There, they met with key members of the Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pensions (HELP) Committee, where we emphasized the staggering human and economic toll of sepsis on American families and the healthcare system.

Meetings included productive conversations with senior staff from the offices of Senators Tim Scott (R-SC), Roger Marshall (R-KS), Josh Hawley (R-MO), and Ashley Moody (R-FL), in addition to direct engagement with the offices of co-sponsors Senators Schumer and Collins.

End Sepsis says that it has long championed the need for a comprehensive federal response to sepsis, and that it remains fully committed to securing the passage of this landmark legislation.

"With bipartisan leadership and broad healthcare industry backing, we are laser-focused on moving this bill forward to protect millions of Americans from one of the leading causes of death and healthcare costs in the nation," End Sepsis said.

In a statement, Ciaran and Orlaith Staunton thanked Senator Schumer for his "unwavering leadership in championing this lifesaving bill."

They added: "13 years ago, sepsis claimed the life of our 12-year-old son, Rory.

"Since then, we've dedicated ourselves to ensuring other families don't endure the same heartbreak.

"Sepsis takes hundreds of thousands of lives each year, strains our healthcare system, and costs \$64 billion annually.

"This bill is a major milestone in the fight against a preventable and treatable condition.

"As a child, Rory liked nothing better than helping people and lifting them up. He is still lifting us all up now and urging us to fight even harder. Our promise to him is that we will."

A beautiful boy leaves this earth, the hardest column I will ever write Niall O'Dowd's heartbreaking tribute to his 12-year-old nephew Rory Staunton, who passed away from sepsis on April 1, 2012, in New York. Editor's Note: In this column, first published in April 2012, IrishCentral founder Niall O'Dowd mourns the death of his 12-year-old nephew Rory Staunton. In the years since *Rory's untimely passing, his* family launched the END

SEPSIS movement and helped secure the passage of new sepsis regulations in New York hospitals, known as Rory's Regulations.

This is the toughest column I will ever write and the one I least expected to.

On Sunday, April 1, 2012, in a New York hospital, my beautiful 12-year-old nephew Rory Staunton passed from this earth. Rory wasn't just my nephew, he was the son I never had, the precious possession of my sister Orlaith and her husband Ciaran Staunton, along with their daughter Kathleen. Orlaith was the one that followed me to America. I introduced her and Ciaran on an Irish weekend in the Catskills back in the 1990s. Soon they were pledged to each other and they have had a wonderful marriage and family.

From earliest times, Rory was a laughing little boy, an impish toddler always ready for fun, especially when his sister Kathleen and her sidekick, my daughter Alana, were involved. In later years, he was also strangely mature for his age, taking part in adult conversations while other kids played childhood games.

I tried to steal Rory away often; a Notre Dame game, a weekend at our house, whenever the opportunity presented itself. I reveled in this big laughing Irishman, with "The Simpsons" and "Family Guy" obsession, the absurd sense of humor, and the serious political side of him who studied American politics with the intensity of a professional. JFK was his hero, he told me, because of his idealism. Rory too wanted to make a difference, to help the less well off. For one so young he already had a highly developed social conscience. He had already been to the White House and had met President Obama and Michelle on St. Patrick's Day in 2011. Not surprisingly, given his parents and their keen interest in all things political, Rory was fast becoming a political

expert.

Rory charmed the pants off whoever met him. The girls were already showing interest, but Rory was a busy guy. He had taken flying lessons at 11, leaving his parents with their hearts in their mouths as he flew fearlessly into the wild blue yonder with his instructor.

Ireland was his spiritual home. On vacations back in his Dad's Mayo or his Mom's Kerry and Louth, he fell in with the locals and a gaggle of cousins, discussed Mayo's continued Gaelic Football failures with the best of them, and came back to New York as attuned to Ireland and its rhythms as any local.

He was about to spread his wings, and Georgetown University and its politics degree were on his radar. Rory was opening up, emerging from a chrysalis, ready for the beckoning world, to take flight.

Then on April 1, we lost him. Four days earlier, he had received an elbow scrape after falling while playing basketball, which had somehow allowed a toxic bacteria into his system. Two days later he was hospitalized, fighting for his life, a battle he ultimately lost.

There is an air of unreality even as I write this. My beautiful red-headed, five-foot nine-inch tall nephew has departed, leaving an utterly broken family and circle of friends that stretches from New York to Ireland to many other points behind. It was the worst weekend of my life as I watched the beloved boy battle vainly against the host of toxins that were attacking him.

Despite the best efforts of outstanding doctors and nurses in the Intensive Care Unit, the darling boy did not survive.

He is gone now into the wild blue yonder where he used to travel as a pilot in the making. Soar high Rory, and keep watch on us down below. We love you and miss you so much. Someday with a blue sky above and a fair wind behind, and our hearts full, our dreams will come true and we will meet our beautiful boy again.

Until then, slan go foill a chuisle mo chroi.

## A Bike Ride to remember Grace O'Malley-Kumar

Bikers' emotional tribute to 'courageous and brave' Grace O'Malley-Kumar Money was raised for Grace's foundation at the event, with attendees including her parents Dr Sanjoy and Dr Sinead

Dozens of motorcyclists came together to pay their tributes to Grace O'Malley-Kumar in a bike meet to raise money for a foundation in her name. Organised by PC Dave Merry, a family friend of the Kumar family, the emotional and poignant bike meet follows last year's 'Ride of Remembrance', which took those involved from Essex all the way to Newark Showground. This year, a similar event was held in Essex, once again set up by PC Dave Merry, encouraging motorcyclists to celebrate Grace's life. As part of this

year's event on Sunday (June 1), members of the

Nottinghamshire Blood Bikes charity biked down from Nottingham to be part of the parade.

Last year, a blood transfusion service bike was unveiled with Grace's name in her own handwriting printed on the side. This was funded by the money raised and the bike is part of Nottinghamshire Blood Bikes' fleet, used to transport blood to various hospitals and emergency centres in urgent situations.

Grace's parents, Dr Sanjoy Kumar and Dr Sinead O'Malley-Kumar, attended Sunday's event amongst hundreds of bikers. Grace, the 19-year-old University of Nottingham student who was fatally stabbed by Valdo Calocane in the Nottingham attacks of June 2023, had taken a test to be able to ride a motorbike and saved up for a Vespa and insurance for it.

PC Merry met Mr Kumar through the Metropolitan Police, where they both worked - Dr Kumar as a forensic medical examiner - and he had known Grace since she was young. "Grace was courageous and brave," Mr Merry said.

He was given a coronavirus vaccine by Grace when she volunteered as one of the youngest vaccinators in the

country during the pandemic. PC Merry added: "She volunteered her time to vaccinate many officers from the Metropolitan Police, while she vaccinated hundreds of other people in the community. I was not there to protect her so this is my way of reaching out.

"She used to ride her Vespa to the Vaccination Centre - now I'm getting police and other bikers together to pay our respects to this brave and courageous young lady."

In a statement, the Nottinghamshire Blood Bikes added: "We stand in unity and remembrance as we join fellow bikers, family, friends, and the wider community to honour the memory of Grace O'Malley-Kumar - a remarkable young woman whose life was tragically cut short, but whose legacy of compassion, courage, and service lives on.

"Grace was not only a medical student with a bright future, but a true embodiment of care and selflessnessqualities that resonate deeply with our mission as volunteer blood bikers".

It comes after the families of the victims of the attacks invited the public to join them in a memorial walk on the second anniversary of attacks. The families are encouraging those attending the walk to wear colours of either yellow and green or red.

The yellow and green will represent sports at the University of Nottingham, which both Grace and Barnaby Webber took part in, whilst red will represent Ian Coates' beloved Nottingham Forest.

Kildare woman Jenny Melia has been named head of one of Ireland's largest enterprise agencies.


